Five Residents File to Run for Poolesville Commission

Five persons have stepped forward to throw their names in the ring of candidates for Town of Poolesville commissioner. With the election on November 8, all voters should be advised that voting for town commissioner is held at the Poolesville Town Hall, not at the general election district sites. Two openings on the commission will be filled by this vote: Kerri Cook is stepping down as commissioner; Jim Brown's position is up for vote, and he is running for reelection.

The Monocle requested that each candidate provide brief statements explaining why he/she chose to run, along with background information. The five candidates, in alphabetical order, are:

Jim Brown

I want to thank all Poolesville residents for your strong support over the years. I'm running for reelection as your town commissioner because, under my return to a leadership position, we've turned the town hall "ship"

around, and we've secured over \$120 million in funding for many important initiatives (including an almost-all-new PHS!) but still face many challenges, both current and new, that will require my veteran and proven stewardship at the helm.

I plan to continue to be the lead advocate, along with my Fair Access Committee partners, for the proper completion of PHS (including a proper-sized Fred Swick-dedicated main gymnasium). Under my countyand state-wide recognized leadership, we'll continue to push for a fullyfunded Community/Wellness Center as well as a "bubble" over the pool to turn it into a year-round facility. We have a critical trash contract to negotiate (we know how important this is!). With our Streetscape Safety Initiative now primarily grant funded, I'll work with my fellow commissioners and our Planning Commission to implement this transformative project as well as our new Compressive Plan with built-in growth limits.

Background: Currently, he is the commission president and a local realtor.

Eddie Kuhlman

I am running for commissioner because I want to again do my part to keep Poolesville great and make it even better. There will always be challenges in the future, and I want to roll up my sleeves and help Poolesville continue to be an amazing community. I have the knowledge and the experience needed. I am retired and have the time to commit. If elected, I would serve the town with an open mind, dedication, and integrity. With past experience in negotiating, I have learned how to reach constructive results, so all sides feel positive about the outcome. We need to continue safeguarding as well as advancing our corner of the county. Having served the town in the past was a great honor and privilege, Poolesville is a treasure that needs to remain a wonderful place in which to live and to raise our future generations.

Commissioners Begin Consideration of Renewing Trash and Recycling Contract By Link Hoewing

At their regular meeting on October 3, the Town of Poolesville commissioners began discussions about the trash and recycling contract for the town that will be up for renewal next June. Even though the time to renewing the contract seems distant, a number of concerns is driving the commissioners to begin early discussions about the contract.

For one thing, there have been continuing complaints about the service provided by the current contractor, Bates Trucking, although service levels have improved at various points.

Another complex issue that will take time to sort out is how recycling will be performed under the new contract. Right now, the town allows for single-stream recycling in its recycling operations. This means all kinds of recycled materials from glass to plastic to paper products are commingled and transported by Bates to the county recycling center. While single-stream recycling is convenient for customers, it affects the quality of recycled products and can result in the eventual rejection of some recycled materials and their disposal in trash dumps. Under a dual-stream model, citizens would be required to separate metals, glass, and plastic from all paper and cardboard products, and the trash hauler would be required either to keep them separate in their trucks or offer two separate pickups to keep the recycled material separate.

Finally, some aspects of the existing contract with Bates are unusual in the industry, such as twice-a-week pick-ups. The existing contract is also substantially cheaper than can be negotiated in the existing market, so cost will be a significant factor. Trash and recycling services constitute the single largest contract funded by the town to the tune of \$520,000.

Commissioner Jim Brown said that he wanted to begin the discussion on the trash and recycling contract because of the many complexities and high costs involved that have to be worked out. He also said that, depending on who wins the contract, it would

Rande(m) Thoughts Will the Real Iohn Poole, Ir. Please Stand Up?

In the current discussion about renaming John Poole Middle School, I am reminded of an old TV quiz show, "To Tell the Truth." For those out of the "silverpeeps" loop and not around at the time, three people would claim to be the same person, and the panelists had to decide who was answering with the truth and who was lying. The drama built until Bob Collyer finally said, "Will the real [name of person] please stand up?"

The county is currently considering dropping the name John Poole from the middle school because he was a slaveowner. In the census report from his times, there are four John Pooles. While John Poole, Jr. did own slaves, we believe the John Poole they are using to justify removing his name is the wrong John Poole. Here's why.

In the 1800 census report and biography used in the county's study, it reported that John Poole, Jr. owned seven slaves and bought a "negro girl" in 1799. For two reasons I believe this to be the wrong John Poole. In that census tally of household members for a John Poole, there is no female less than twenty-six years of age. Our John's wife was Priscilla Sprigg, born in 1780, she was just nineteen years old. The record used said there was one female over forty in the household. Not so for J. Poole, Jr.

John Poole, Sr. and his brother Joseph are not recorded as owning slaves. In fact, Joseph eventually returned to England.

Census records seem to show that Priscilla's father, Frederick Sprigg, had three enslaved people. Major Frederick Sprigg died in 1791. It's possible that at some point Priscilla may have inherited the three as she seems to be an only child. Of course, we doubt the three slaves lived with them in 1800 in the log cabin. English law would have had the son-in-law as the recipient of the inheritance not the daughter, so while he "owned" inherited three slaves, they most likely remained on the farm in Barnesville.

With no previous Poole family history of owning slaves, should the inheritance of slaves cause us to remove John Poole, Jr.'s name from the middle school? Judging on that problematic status alone leaves out the other aspects of this man.

Who was John Poole, Jr.? He was a religious man, an original signer to the St. Peter's registry, lay reader at the church, filling in when priests were not present, and a member of its elected vestry. He was known to conduct personal religious lessons on Sunday to his family, in which he welcomed his "servants" to attend.

While running the trading post, he served the community as an essential merchant. Of the fifteen acres he got from his father, he sold sub-lots to others, which resulted in other commercial entities, most likely a blacksmith or possibly a cobbler. What little land was left did not need a slave to care for it.

If John Poole, Jr. did not help establish a commercial aspect to our area through his store and the other establishments he sold land to, Poolesville would not have been created, nor would the store have been selected as a postal office known as Poole's Store. Our town may have been called Chiswell, Brightwell, or Petersville.

As reference to his character, it should be noted his peers highly respected and trusted him. He was selected by the community to be a "Factor." At a time and place of more trading than currency, a factor acted as an economic judge, adjudicating impasse when parties could not settle on a fair arrangement for a trade. This position was given men to whom people trusted to be fair.

Priscilla and he had ten children, all surviving youth. As the head of the household, he was solely responsible for everyone under the roof, family and slaves, their food, their clothing, and their general welfare.

To be clear: I'm opposed to renaming JPMS on the basis of this "other" John Poole who owned seven slaves, as deemed by MCPS. He is not the man after whom Poolesville's middle school was named. Our John Poole, Jr. was an upright, respectable, eminent businessman (and more!) of our town. I can't understand how any person can think it right to be the owner of another person, and if our John Poole, Jr. did end up owning slaves, it seems that it may have been because his wife inherited them. This is not very different from the case of George Washington who liberated his slaves but had no legal say on his wife's doings.

There are lots of "isms" going around these days. Judging John Poole, Jr. solely as an owner of enslaved persons, disregarding his other positive aspects and contributions to our history and lives, I believe is on a narrow-minded path of "presentism." Judging people of the past based solely on our current experience is a myopic self-aggrandizing view.

Second Chance for Public to Comment On the Future of Recreation at White's Ferry

The National Park Service (NPS) is again seeking public input as it takes the next steps to improve opportunities for recreation at Chesapeake and Ohio Canal National Historical Park.

On October 12, the NPS will host a public meeting and begin the second public comment period to continue the preparation of a Development Concept Plan for White's Ferry. The public is invited to comment until November 12.

The purpose of a Development Concept Plan is to evaluate existing park conditions and create future plans for visitor enjoyment and recreation, and park preservation.

In its plan, the NPS proposes to: Improve forest areas and stream buffers throughout the area; open a gathering and play area, add new picnic tables and restrooms, and repair the pavilion on the north tract; and add campgrounds on the south tract.

White's Ferry is approximately seventy-three acres, made up of two tracts of land, and includes open spaces, a picnic pavilion, a large parking lot, wooded areas, river access, historic structures, and access to private lands; however, there is currently no access to the canal towpath, and the area lies in a floodplain.

The area surrounds a private property where the White's Ferry ferry operation and White's Ferry Store & Grill are located. The future of the ferry operation is not within the scope of this Development Concept Plan.

NPS will not pursue commercial development of the site.

Public participation is vital to the planning process. There are several ways to get involved.

The NPS will host a live, virtual public meeting on October 12 from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. To participate, visit parkplanning.nps.gov/whitesferry conceptplan.





Meet Your Vet

Sean Ivusic: From a Meandering Life to a Missile Guided Cruiser

For navy veteran, Sean Ivusic, making the decision to enlist in the U.S. Navy was more than just a career move, it was a life changer.

As a tenth grader, Sean's outlook on a path to a career or a livelihood looked foggy, at best. The teenager's friends, other young men like himself, lacked motivation and ambition, and they had little direction or sense of positive purpose. He found school boring which led to the decision to drop out, get a job, make some money, and then maybe, find what he was looking for in life. The outlook for a stable career for this young man did not look promising.

While working a full-time job at a photo finishing shop, a navy advertisement caught Sean's eye. The ad announced that the navy was looking to hire electrical technicians. Sean thought this would be a fantastic opportunity to get away from his current listless life. He met a local U.S. Navy recruiter, liked what he heard, but at seventeen he couldn't just sign up—he needed his mother's permission. Like many mothers, military service concerned her, but in the end, she reluctantly agreed to sign his permission forms.

He signed up, took the ASVAB (the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery, a multiple-aptitude battery that measures developed abilities and helps predict future academic and occupational success in the military), and did quite well.

The U.S. Navy sent him to the Recruit Training Command Great Lakes. While there, he often heard others talking about going to Navy A School, short for Assessment Training. After a ten-week boot camp, sailors go to receive technical training in their selected military occupational specialty at an A School. In the midst of boot camp, Sean discovered his actual orders didn't include an A School—didn't include anything about being an electrical technician—and he discovered he was headed straight to the fleet, no specialized training, just a swabby way of life.

At that moment, Sean found a new sense of maturity. Instead of anger and frustration, he focused on a solution. He asked his Company Commander if he could attend an A School. The commander hemmed and hawed, only agreeing to consider it.

Sean, determined to reach his goal, chose to work hard and be on his best behavior. It paid off. Towards the end of boot camp, he received orders to attend Operations Specialist A School in Dam Neck, Virginia. He was elated, to say the least.

While in A School, he began to shine, to stand out, applying himself in his newfound vocation, learning how to be an Operations Specialist, essentially manning radar and navigation in C.I.C.—Combat Information Center (the nerve center of combat for the ship). He graduated second in his class out of fifty.

After A School, sailors are allowed to select their billet, their duty station. He found two that appealed to him. The first was Over the Horizon Radar Station in Alaska which meant shore duty, and the other was Pre-Commissioning the USS *Lake Champlain* CG-57, which meant being on a brand-new ship, a prospect that he also found appealing.

The guy ahead of him chose the Alaska duty, something Sean would come to believe was a stroke of luck.

Sean accepted duty on the Ticonderoga-class guided missile cruiser, the *Lake Champlain* CG-57, moored in Pascagoula, Mississippi, prior to her commissioning. "We commissioned the USS *Lake Champlain* CG-57 in New York, across from the Intrepid Pier on August 12, 1988, and the rest was a fantastic, wonderful redirection of my life.

"My life had been completely changed by the navy, literally, from misdirection, no motivation, and no discipline to joining the military and finding, for me, direction and purpose."

He got out after the four-year enlistment, a time for him that "turned out to be fantastic," meeting many great friends, visiting cool ports and places he would otherwise would have never seen.

While at the Dam Neck A School, he earned his G.E.D., and while at San Diego, the home port for the USS *Lake Champlain*, he attended night school and received his High School Diploma.

After the navy he attended Northern Virginia Community College and received an associate's in Business Administration (1994), matriculating to the University of Virginia to complete a bachelor's in Commerce at the McIntire School of Commerce (1996) and then his master's in Management of Information Systems (1997).

Today, Sean works for NIH as a government contractor providing database architecture services and consultation. In 2015, the family moved to Poolesville, with his wife, Maureen, a tai chi instructor and chocolatier who has built a local following, his son, Tanner, who loves to play baseball and who attends the Global Ecology Studies Program at PHS, and his daughter, Cora, keenly into gymnastics, who attends JPMS.

When the members of his American Legion discovered he never really attended a high school graduation, they created their own version of a high school diploma, put Sean in a cap and gown, played "Pomp and Circumstance," and gave him the graduation ceremony he never had.

Sean Ivusic's journey through the military is a time-honored one: One of newfound direction, one that profoundly altered the entire course of his life. Was it easy? Sean is adamant: "Hell no, but nothing worth doing ever is, and through it all, it was a fantastic ride."

A farmer all his life, Donald moved


and settled in 1965, with his family, in Carroll County. There, he operated Char-Lene Farm, a working dairy farm that later transitioned into a successful beef and crop operation.

Commissioners Begin Consideration of Renewing Trash and Recycling Contract

be good to have them on board before the June deadline to provide a "buffer" so they can plan and be ready to roll as soon as the old contract expires.

Town Manager Wade Yost, in opening the discussion on the topic, explained that the town extended the Bates contract a year ago because at the time "no one wanted to take it on." He pointed out that, while the town could include a requirement for dual-stream recycling in its bid proposal, some companies may not be able to fulfill that requirement. It is likely that dual streaming would raise costs to a degree, depending on how the company fulfills the requirement. He also said it is almost unheard for companies in the industry to offer twice-aweek pickups.

Commissioner Jeff Eck said that, in a memo prepared by Yost about companies who have outlined the services they could offer and likely bid costs, some of the proposals were almost twice as high as the existing Bates contract.

Commissioner Ed Reed, who sits on the Sustainable Poolesville Committee, said he and the committee are very concerned that the town do all it can to continue to improve its policies affecting the environment. For that reason, the committee is very supportive of moving the town's recycling operations to a dual-stream system. He added that there was a recent survey of resident preferences regarding trash and recycling services, and the largest share of the public who responded either had no opinion about whether the town should move to dual streaming or preferred single streaming. He hopes the town and the committee can help educate the public about why the town should move to dual streaming.

Don Street, the chair of the Sustainable Poolesville Committee and Solidad Aguilar, who works with the committee, testified in support of dual streaming. Street said that it is "undeniable that dual streaming is better than single streaming" in terms of its impact on the environment. When recycled products are separated, it keeps contaminants such as water, oils, and other chemicals from covering the paper and cardboard products. Once that happens, most of the paper products have to be taken to the trash. Dual streaming eliminates this problem.

Aguilar noted that, in Maryland, more than 6.2 million tons of CO_2 alone is eliminated each year due to effective recycling of all recyclable products. She admitted that dual streaming takes more work, for example, requiring trucks to keep recycled products separate. She also said it does take more work in the home, but it is certainly far from impossible to manage.

Joyce Breiner, from Poolesville Green and also a member of the Sustainable Poolesville Committee, agreed with the comments of Street and Aguilar. She explained that, as a result of adopting dual streaming, less burning in incinerators is needed which can help lessen the need for the incinerator that has operated outside Dickerson for so long. In addition to recycling, the town and its citizens should move towards more composting because of a lot of the waste burned in the incinerator is spoiled food. Poolesville should set an example of effective recycling to help make an even stronger case to close the incinerator.

In other business, the town gave final approval to the \$7.7 million project designed to dramatically reduce the release of nitrogen compounds into Dry Seneca Creek.

Commissioner Eck also noted that the Parks Board, on which he sits as a member, is going to be undertaking a number of projects of importance to citizens, including a redesign and upgrade of the skatepark, plans to build a "bouldering park" meant for adults and teens, and the installation of more speed bumps in various roads in town. Commissioner Radigan, in his comments about the Planning Commission on which he sits as a member, commented that the commission is making steady and very positive progress on a new master plan. He expects a draft to be available in early spring.

Why is My Dog Leaking? Understanding Reasons for Urinary Leakage Peter H. Eeg, DVM

If your canine friend is house compliant when doing his or her business and has not had accidents in the house since being a youngster, a sudden return to peeing in the house is not a failure of your training. It is an important clinical indication that something is not correct with his/her urinary tract.

The Urinary Tract incorporates the kidneys, ureters (tubes from kidney to bladder), bladder, urethra (tube from bladder to anterior vaginal vault or penis), prostate (male dogs only), or the vaginal and the vulva or external penile opening. Problems can be found in any one of these locations.

The first thing to pay attention to is the color and amount. If there is a moderate to large amount of urine and there is discoloration (cream to red), bring your pet to your veterinarian as soon as you can. Your veterinarian may ask you to come up first to get a urine collection kit so you can get a urine sample and bring it with you. Alternately, when you arrive, stay in your car and let the staff know you have arrived. They can meet you at the car to collect urine when your canine hits the ground. If the urine color is normal, then note the location in which he/she is peeing inappropriately (the bed, your bed, the back door rug, under the table, on your kid's toys, etc.). This is valuable information for your veterinarian to help narrow down the reason.

Male canines can have problems with their prostate glands. This reproductive organ that is identical to human males' can become infected, abnormally enlarged, or develop cancer. Special prostatic "washing" can be done to evaluate the prostate and determine if there is a problem in this organ.

Females can have several conditions causing urine leakage that are not infection related. These include: spay incontinence (low estrogen level incontinence) or urethral sphincter mechanism incompetence or a rare condition called urethral sphincter hypotonus.

These conditions can be diagnosed by excluding other reasons. In some cases a Cystoscopy (video scoping the urinary tract) may be required to see how the bladder and support components of the urinary tract are working and where the leaking is occurring.

The good news is there are medications that can be prescribed for these conditions that will return the urinary system to a more normal state. The bad news is that once your canine friend has one of these conditions, lifelong treatment is usually needed.
